This year marks the 125th anniversary of the DAR, Daughters of the American Revolution. Following the centennial of America's founding in 1876, a group of men and women met to organize a group to preserve the history and thoughts of the Revolutionary War which achieved our country's separation from Great Britain. It was felt that this might be a unifying way to honor our earlier soldiers and expend energy which would cause a spirit of agreement among all faithful Americans.

With the emphasis on military and history, it seems simple to observe what better place than in the capital of the

United States to begin work on this new idea. A group of men sent out a call for women who were descended from early patriots. However, the men's group later known as the SAR, Sons of the American Revolution, voted to exclude women from their all men's society.

From this, a small group of women continued to work toward the same purpose and four women are credited with being the actual founders of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

These four women are: Mary Desha, Mary Smith Lockwood, Ellen Hardin Walworth, and Eugenia Washington.

Mary Desha was descended from both a patriot soldier and a mother who was dispatch bearer at the time. She was part of the group that first responded to the SAR men's call and later extended all of her



effort to bring the women's group to fruition. She also spent a significant amount of time working with the soldiers of the Spanish-American War. Along with her day job in a government office she worked every night at the Hospital Corps in Washington for the benefit of the wounded soldiers. She died suddenly at the age of 61 likely from the effects of overwork.

Mary Smith Lockwood's contribution as a founder was to strongly encourage the progress of women. She considered all of the "daughters" of the DAR Society as her daughters. She held a number of offices in the early fledgling society.

Ellen Hardin Walworth, born in Illinois, was the daughter of a congressman who was also a veteran of the Mexican-American War. Her husband was abusive to her and during her marriage she took up the study of law and was licensed to practice in New York and the District of Columbia. She was present at the field hospital at Fort Monroe and met the first wounded brought home from the Spanish-American War at Santiago.

Eugenia Washington, who was born near Charleston, WV, was a direct descendant of George Washington's brother, Samuel. Her mother had died when she was young and she was responsible for the care of her invalid father. They had the misfortune of being in Fredericksburg when the famous Civil War battle occurred in 1862. She and her father were caught, unable to escape, and spent the day huddled in a small trench in a desperate condition.

From these four women and the efforts of thousands of others, this enduring patriotic organization has grown. The DAR is represented by 3000 chapters both nationally and internationally. The names of these chapters are a recital of American history, each name honoring a person who contributed significantly to American history or an important location.

Do you have a family story? Check it out. It may enrich your life more than you can imagine. You may be surprised at what you find and then you may be secure and proud that your family has given something special to this country. But all of us can thank the women of the DAR, for carrying on the memories of our brave patriots.

Pearisburg Water Rate Increase

Effective November 1, 2015 a water rate increase became effective. The minimum bill for up to 2500 gallons was increased by \$3.75 per month. The minimum bill for water will increase from \$22.00 to \$25.75. No change was made to the cost of water used above the minimum. The increase will appear on bills mailed to customers in December.

Council increased the water rate following a presentation by the Public Service Authority concerning a need for additional funding. Council felt that if a water rate increase was not put in place at this time the PSA would have moved forward with a River Withdrawal Project. This would have resulted in significantly higher water rate increases being needed. The PSA will put in place several capital improvements in the near future that will be beneficial. These include adding a backup generator at the water treatment plant and connecting the Tannery Well to the town's backup generator at the Wastewater Treatment Plant.

PEARISBURG BUSINESS CORNER

The town has several new businesses coming soon. Dollar Tree is under construction in the Pearisburg Square shopping center. Hurley Drug Store plans are being reviewed for a new store to be located on the corner of Wenonah Avenue and French Street. Staff is working with a small business wanting to locate into the Shelton Place storefront and we hope to make an announcement soon. We are also working with a developer for one or more new businesses on the vacant lot on Boxwood near Wal-Mart.

In addition, the town welcomes Buckland Law Firm, Katherine's Royalty Pageants, Serenity Nail Salon, and Mathew's Jewelry as new members of the town's business community. As always the Town of Pearisburg encourages you to shop locally whenever possible.

NEW BOAT RAMPS CONSTRUCTED

Giles County and the Town of Pearisburg are constructing boat landings at Whitt Riverbend park and at Bluff City. The Bluff City landing was dedicated to John Hale in October and is nearing completion. A restroom facility is being added at that location to go along with the paved access and parking area and concrete ramp. This area serves as a major take out along the River for many canoe and raft trips.

The Whitt Riverbend Park landing is also under construction and will include restrooms, paved access and parking areas. This new landing will be part of the 28-acre public park maintained by the Town. The Park includes camping, picnic pavilion, and walking trails. This landing will provide an improved access over the existing informal pull offs located along the access road to the park.

The Giles County Homeless Shelter – The Hope House

Mission Statement

The Giles County Shelter's mission is to provide a safe emergency shelter for families experiencing a housing crisis and to connect them with supportive services that promote and enhance their self---sufficiency and stability.

People Served

The homeless population of Giles County is those individuals and families living in areas unfit for human habitation, those who have been victim to house fire, and those who are stranded or have been evicted from their homes. The two-unit home is occupied the majority of days each year. Generally, the length of stay at the Shelter is limited to 2 weeks, although the time can be extended depending on the particular circumstances.

Operational Background

The Giles County Homeless Shelter began operating in Pearisburg in a small mobile home in 1990. Later the Shelter moved to a house on Curve Road. This single unit could not meet the needs of the homeless as only one family could be served at a time. With a growing population of homeless families, the Shelter expanded. Relocating to Narrows and selling the property on Curve Road occurred in May of 2008. Hope House is located at 138 Old Virginia Avenue just off Route 460 in Narrows.

One unit is a single occupancy suitable for either one person or for a parent and child. The second unit is suitable for families. Both units are handicapped equipped. With the expansion came additional capital costs as well as anticipated increased operating costs.

Funding

The Giles County Homeless Shelter relies on donations to support capital costs of Hope House as well as the operational costs. The Shelter Board has solicited financial support from businesses, churches, individuals, governmental units, United Fund and the Community Foundation of the New River Valley.

Hope House is grateful to all those who have donated funds as well as other household items to the shelter in the past. Students from various colleges have also helped to repair and maintain the outside areas of the shelter. We continue to strive to fund capital outlay cost associated with the increased shelter capacity. If you have any questions about how you can assist, please contact any one of the board members.




