This summer visitors to Waterford and members of the Society can enjoy a visit to Waterford's own museum. The museum is open 2 - 5 p.m. on Sundays and by appointment at other times. The summer season for the Museum will begin July 5. Suggested donation for non-member visitors is one dollar for adults, twenty-five cents for children.

The Mary Gage Rice Museum was founded by Huvy Gage in the early thirties. Its rejuvenation came last year through the urgings of James Tyler and the late Christopher Rounds.

The building was a lean-to shed brought to Waterford from Sweden. It belonged to Mrs. Rice and the contents donated by her to the Society. Funds were raised to purchase and move the single room building to its permanent location on the Library lot. The move came in the summer of 1980.

The Museum contains items found in cellar holes in Waterford, Sweden, Stoneham, Albany and Bethel. Tools, ironware, candle molds, butterchurns, spinningwheels, a loom and many other implements necessary to village life in earlier days are lisplayed on the bare board walls and beams.

The original stone fireplace could not be moved with the building so Bill Fillebrown built a new fireplace at the new site. The brick mantle will carry a plaque in memory of Christopher Rounds which will be unveiled June 28 at 2 p.m.





He says, "I am the youngest son of Christopher Robert Hamlin, who was the youngest son of Cyrus. I've been a university professor and library director all of my life and retired two years ago." We are happy he has joined our Society.

Capt. Keith F. Brown, U.S. Navy (Ret.) of San Diego, California is our latest LIFE member. He received information about Waterford from postmistress Edith T. Kimball, Lilliam Kimball, Judy Olmstead of Bear Mt. Village, and Margaret Sawyer. Rounds, and a brass plate naming Bill Fillebrown as the builder. The fireplace is a work of art and members are very proud of it.

#### SPRING CLEANING AT NORTH WATERFORD HALL

With warm weather here, the Society will set to work at the North Waterford Hall. Agnes Lahti, Alice Rounds, Margaret Sawyer, Helen Buchert and Lynn Baker will be cleaning, arranging and cataloguing the collection there.

The Society obtained the Hall in 1973 when the Evergreen Rebekah Lodge of North Waterford decided that they could no longer maintain it. The building is the former IOOF Hall given to the Lodge when they disbanded in 1961.

A trust was started by the Society from donations for the maintenance of the building. The collection was moved from Flora Abbott's to the Hall in 1976.

Waterford, Maine 1875-1976 was published in August, 1977. Copies are still available: from the Waterford Town Office, Mrs. Curtis Millett above Waterford Memorial School, and by mail, plus 75¢ postage and handling from Margaret Sawyer, Treasurer. In the State, the book is \$10.00, and if mailed, \$10.75. Out of State the book is \$9.52, plus 75¢. (That is less our state tax).



They owned and operated Camp Ironwood (now Bear Mt. Village) from 1924 to 1964 when Matt retired.
